Editorial

WHY TEACH EUROPE IN THE EUROPEAN SCHOOL OF THE 21ST CENTURY?

The following text is taken from the training programme offered to teachers in schools participating in the "European School of the 21st Century" project.

Being a European teacher means:

- Educating future informed and active European citizens

The European Union (EU) and Europe more generally constitute a political, economic and social area that is unique in the world, based on democratic values, human rights, peace and solidarity. The values that Europe has developed over the centuries, at the cost of painful conflicts, are universal and must be protected. Schools in the 21st century can and must contribute to this.

Teaching about Europe should enable pupils to:

- understand that Europe, beyond its various organisations, is a whole that shares values and a model of society.
- discover the European institutions (European Parliament, Commission, Councils, etc.);
- grasp the challenges of European citizenship (rights, mobility, voting in European elections);
- develop a critical mind when faced with populist or nationalist rhetoric.
 - to combat misinformation and prejudice of all kinds.

- Helping them discover their living space

For young Europeans, Europe is not just an abstraction:

- it influences their daily lives (Erasmus+, product standards, free movement, data protection, the environment, etc.);
- it offers opportunities (studies, internships, jobs, travel, transnational projects);
- it shapes their future (climate, digital technology, security, migration, sovereignty).

Editorial (continued)

- Enabling pupils to embrace cultural heritage

Recognition of a shared cultural heritage is a fundamental part of our identity. The aim is to show that this heritage exists primarily at European level rather than at national level.

This understanding of a common heritage on the continent facilitates:

- · Intercultural understanding.
- Dialogue between peers from different countries.
- Open-mindedness and curiosity.

The acquisition of these three social skills characteristic of the 21st century is a priority objective of the project.

This understanding of a shared heritage thus helps to strengthen European identity without denying national or local identities (united in diversity).

- Making them aware of our common history and its lessons

21st-century Europe was born from the ashes of world wars. Teaching history from a multi-perspective European approach enables pupils to:

- understand the causes of past conflicts and reconciliation efforts (e.g. between France and Germany);
 - to promote peace as a common good.
- remember the dangers of extreme nationalism, totalitarianism and xenophobia.

- Turning pupils into eco-citizens of the 21st century by preparing them for global challenges

The contemporary contemporary (ecological transition , digitalisation, inequalities, pandemics, wars) transcend national borders.

Europe is an essential framework for:

- understanding the global scale of the challenges and the importance of local action,
 - cooperating in the face of crises,
 - defending common standards (social, environmental, digital).

Teaching about Europe is not about spreading pro-European propaganda: it is about giving pupils the keys to understanding the world they live in, exercising their citizenship in an informed manner and actively participating in the future of their continent.

In an increasingly complex, unstable and interdependent world, these civic skills are essential.

This is a priority for European schools in the 21st century.

The Erasmus+ 2026 call for proposals is now open

The European Commission has announced the opening of the annual Erasmus+ call for proposals on Wednesday 12 November at

7 p.m.

This call for proposals introduces a pilot initiative for partnerships to build networks of schools in Europe. This new framework for cooperation should enable organisations to exchange, test and implement innovative teaching methods that promote the acquisition of basic skills. These networks should also support the EU's efforts to promote civic engagement around the values of democracy in Europe.

AEDE-France, through its project "The European School of the 21st Century", has anticipated this request from the European Commission.


Cnesco conference on international comparisons of the teaching profession



AEDE-FRANCE PROJECTS



A SUCCESSFUL LAUNCH

The flagship project of AEDE-France, approved by the European Commission with the highest rating of all the projects submitted, was launched from 16 to 18 October in Paris.

The pilot schools in Rio Tinto Porto (PT), Nafplio (GR), Khan Krum Sofia (BG), Trzebnica (PL) and Cap d'Ail (FR), along with expert partners from the universities of Cordoba, Bremen and Wroclaw and the Cordoba Teachers' Centre, spent three days launching the project under optimal conditions.



The group worked together effectively and collaboratively.

The working relationships and friendships forged during previous projects enabled the new partners to embark on this unprecedented adventure with efficiency and good humour.

The European School of the 21st Century fits perfectly with the European Commission's project to create an alliance of European schools.

Ms Jessica LARSSON, Head of the European Commission Representation in France, was keen to participate in the launch meeting and provided us with much-appreciated support.

The group of experts presented the questionnaire that will be used to assess the situation in each school in terms of four areas of observation: multilingualism, inclusion, sustainability and quality of management.

This impressively accurate and comprehensive tool will enable each school to identify its strengths and resources and better define areas for improvement.

A roadmap will be sent to each school by the expert group after analysing the responses to the four questionnaires.

THE STRASBOURG TRAINING COURSE

From 12 to 15 November, two teachers from each pilot school gathered at the Saint Thomas Cultural Centre in Strasbourg to take part in the "Become a European teacher" training course led by Cristina Muñoz Aranda, Marie-Laure Croguennec and Christian Saint-Lezer.

An introduction to European literacy and a tour of the institutions preceded sessions on adopting the European programme for schools and how to give a European dimension to all teaching.





A highly informative visit to the Council of Europe

The next project meeting will take place from 2 to 4 March 2026 in Nafplio, Greece.



The parallel partnership project brings together schools from Latvia, Italy, the Czech Republic, France and Spain, pending confirmation from Austria and Belgium.



The schools met online for the first time and received the materials provided to the schools in the parent group, including questionnaires to assess the current situation and a report on the Strasbourg training course. Cristina Muñoz Aranda launched the TwinSpace, which will enable them to exchange ideas over the next three years.

The next online meeting in December will be devoted to preparing the KA 210 application file, which will be submitted next March.

AEDE-FRANCE AT THE COUNCIL OF EUROPE

Christian Saint-Lézer and Heleen Jansen are members of the "Sport and Human Rights" Committee within the Conference of INGOs.

Christian Saint-lézer represented the conference at the meeting of the PACE Parliamentary Alliance for Good Governance and Integrity in Sport held in Paris on 1 December.

The aim was to present the recommendation produced by the Committee on Sport and Human Rights and approved at the conference session on 15 October.



The draft <u>European Young Sportspeople's Charter</u> has the support of the Parliamentary Alliance. It will be regularly included on the agenda of future meetings.

Thanks to the good relations established through, among other things, the European Cultural Project, this innovative initiative will result in a KA 210 project in the field of sport, which will be led by the European Youth Alliance in Sport (EYAS) and submitted next March.

The aim now is to find additional partners from Austria, Latvia, the Netherlands and Spain to help draft the project.
